Links with MCS supporting PE lessons, enables opportunity for teacher to focus on more individual learning in the class.
Broader range of opportunities offered to all pupils:
Health week in Summer term 2022 enabled children to try a wide variety of sports from skateboarding & scooters, to climbing and bike safety. Sports days were a success, particularly due to the involvement of older pupil sports leaders.
New after school sports opportunities– lacrosse & yoga – were added to the existing after school club provision (Hockey and Judo).
Children in EYFS & Year 1 have completed outdoor activities as part of their 'forest school'.
The new KS1 area is allowing children to develop the physical literacy required by the national curriculum and encourages children to be outside, moving and developing key co-ordination and movement skills.
Increased participation in competitive sports:
All children in school took part in a whole school multi-skills competition in Summer 2023 where they learnt about competitive play teamwork and cooperation.
Competitions set up for hockey and festivals (football and rugby) attended.
